On a chilly October Saturday, residents and University of Pittsburgh students volunteered to weed tree pits, shovel gravel in the newly renovated Troy Hill Citizens Park, and re-install two memorial plaques re-located from the park's reconstruction. One plaque is dedicated to Father John Feldmeier, an endeared long time Pastor of Most Holy Name



Church, and one

plaque memorializes Charles Planz, a former Commander

of American Legion Three Hills Post 565. The effort was funded by a 'Love Your Block' grant from servePGH, a program of the City of Pittsburgh and Home Depot Foundation

to revitalize urban areas like Troy Hill! The \$1,000 grant paid for shovels, rakes, paving stones, sand, gravel, saw blades, and

heavy equipment rental. The tree pits along Claim Street blend in with the sidewalk, further contributing a great spot for the

Spaces Corners was founded in 2011 by <u>Melissa Catanese</u> and <u>Ed Panar</u>. The couple met at Cranbrook Academy of Art, a graduate program just outside of Detroit. Catanese was born in Cleveland, OH and Panar in Johnstown, PA. Fascinated by the geography and history of Pennsylvania, they decided to move to Pittsburgh after school, where they resided in Bloomfield. After receiving an opportunity they couldn't refuse in NYC, they relocated there for several years, but after missing Pittsburgh, they decided to return in 2011.

During their first residency in Pittsburgh, the couple would often take road trips to photograph the surrounding area – just outside the city and along country roads. On one of these expeditions, they drove through the <u>Village of Spaces Corners</u>, a small town not far from Pittsburgh just off of Highway 28. They were struck by the name and knew they had to use it someday for a future project. Years later, when they decided to move to Pittsburgh to open their photography bookshop and project space, they knew it was the perfect name.

With the support of the <u>Pennsylvania Council on the Arts</u>, they opened their first space in the Ice House Studios in Lawrenceville in October 2011. They moved on to open a quaint second story shop on 3800 block of Butler Street, also in Lawrenceville. They hosted artist talks, small exhibitions, and readings. Spaces Corners also went on the road representing Pittsburgh at art book fairs in Cleveland, Detroit, Philadelphia, Chicago, and Baltimore and exhibited at The <u>Armory Show</u> in NYC in March 2013. They closed their brick and mortar space in the summer of 2013, continuing their strong online presence as well as their involvement with regional events – with a constant eye out for the perfect live/work space.



In 2012, they met Troy Hill resident, and fellow photography enthusiast, Evan Mirapaul. Joining forces with him, they've helped to organize the PGH Photo Fair in Pittsburgh. As a huge advocate of Spaces Corners and an invested resident of the Troy Hill community, Evan was keen to have them join the neighborhood and would forward them listings or tell them about houses or buildings that might be up for sale. "Evan introduced us to the former owner of the building and when we saw the view from the backyard, we were sold! We have Evan to thank for introducing us to our future home and for helping us secure the building. We think it's a great location and the building has

a lot of potential."

The couple began renovating their new location in Troy Hill (1721 Lowrie) in June 2014 with plans to create a modular space that will serve as part bookshop, gallery, and project space, with an emphasis on their newly-sprouted publishing program. Spaces Corners will open its doors for a sneak peek and an opportunity to do a little holiday shopping on the following days:

Saturday, Dec 20, 2014 2-7pm Saturday, Dec 27, 2014 12-4pm

Beginning January 4, 2015 the shop will be open to the public on Saturdays from Noon to 4pm and by appointment during the week. A proper opening party is planned, stay tuned for the date to be announced! On **Saturday December 20**, (2-7pm) Spaces Corners will host the final scanning event for <u>A People's History of Pittsburgh</u>. Visitors are invited to bring along a personal photograph to contribute to the project. This will be the last scanning event prior to book production. Don't get written out of history - dust off those shoeboxes, open up those albums and consider contributing to this incredible collective family archive!

Reduced rates on fishing licenses, energy-saving tips

There's good news for people who enjoy fishing. The Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission has reduced the price of fishing licenses for the 2015 season.

Beginning Dec. 1, prices will be reduced by approximately 5 percent, or \$1, for resident and non-resident annual licenses. With the reduction, the price for Pennsylvania residents will be \$21.70 for an annual license.

In addition, people who purchase 3-year and 5-year licenses will see a \$3 or \$5 reduction, respectively, IF they buy their licenses in December. The price of a 3-year license for residents will be \$61.70, while a 5-year license will cost \$101.70. Trout/Salmon permits, Lake Erie

permits and combo permits are not included in the price reduction.

The discounts also apply to gift vouchers for annual licenses purchased throughout the year and to gift vouchers for multi-year licenses purchased in December.

You may purchase fishing licenses online through the Fish and Boat Commission's Outdoor Shop. They can also be purchased through various licensing agencies around the region.

### Stay warm this winter and save money!

We've already experienced below-freezing temperatures, and the calendar hasn't even turned to winter.

The Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission has some tips on how you can save on winter energy costs.

The PUC suggests that you:

• Install a programmable furnace thermostat that lowers the temperature automatically at night and raises the temperature during the day. (For every degree you raise or lower your thermostat settings, you can see a difference of up to 3 percent in energy costs.) If you're not able to install a new thermostat, try turning down your current thermostat by a couple of degrees, if at all possible.

- Change your filters in your heating system. Clogged filters can slow airflow and cause your furnace to work harder and run longer than necessary.
- Make sure your home is properly insulated. Proper insulation will ensure your home is warmer in the winter and cooler in the summer.

  Ask your utility provider about participating in a hudget billing.

Ask your utility provider about participating in a budget billing program. These programs average bills out over 12 months and give you a "fixed" amount to pay each month, not just during the winter. (Budget billing does not guarantee an annual fixed rate as bills are subject to quarterly adjustments based on usage.)For more information, call 1-800-692-7380.
